After every match, an official ranks the team, coach, and fans based on their behavior before, during, and after the match based on a ranking from one to ten. The rankings are then averaged out over the season for a total at the end of the season. The NR-W boys varsity volleyball team received a 9.38 out of 10.0.

Forever changed by them are the men they encounter on their journeys: Professor Bhaer (Obadiah Gregg), Laurie Laurence (Colby Balcom), Mr. Laurence (Kalen Roberts), and Mr. Brooke (Quintin Norris).

Performances are held in the North Rose-Wolcott High School Auditorium. Tickets are \$7 for adults, \$5 for students and seniors, and will be available at the door. New this year, a performance

will be held at 6 p.m. on Thursday, February 27. Performances on February 28 and 29 are at 7 p.m., and the performance on March 1 is at 2 p.m. The show’s run time is 2 hours and 30 minutes, including intermission, and is family friendly.
